PART 1

Identify the Current Issue

The word *more* dominates us and can ruin us financially. God wants to take us from the word *more* to the word *enough*. Financial contentment is truly rare. We are driven by the word *more* because:

- 1) We are scared of not having enough.
- 2) We think it can make us happy.
- 3) We think it will make us feel significant.

But God wants to replace the power of the word *more* with the word *enough*. The quality of our lives is not linked to having more money and the stuff that money can buy.

PART 2

Discover the Eternal Principles

Teaching point one: We need to value Jesus more than our possessions.

Teaching point two: We need to value the same things Jesus values.

Exodus 20 contains the Ten Commandments. They are as follows:

- 1. You shall have no other gods before me
- 2. You shall not make for yourself an idol in the form of anything...
- 3. You shall not misuse the name of the LORD your God...
- 4. Remember the Sabbath day by keeping it holy
- 5. Honor your father and your mother
- 6. You shall not murder
- 7. You shall not commit adultery
- 8. You shall not steal
- 9. You shall not give false testimony against your neighbor
- 10. You shall not covet...





Teaching point three: We need to have an attitude of gratefulness and contentment.

PART 3

Apply Your Findings

There is a fairytale about a wealthy merchant, loaded with riches, who was in despair. He wondered why. He asked his companions how he could find happiness.
